Stop Voter Suppression in New York State Primary!

New York has the most restrictive deadline to change party enrollment in the country and deceives the public about the deadline.

To change party enrollment in other states, the average deadline is 25 days before any election. In New York the deadline is October of the year before the primary elections, which is 6 months before the presidential primary and 9 months before the state and local primary. To make matters worse, the instructions on the NY Voter Registration Form indicate the deadline is 25 days!

The Democratic and Republican National Committees are **private organizations** which set the agenda and conduct primary elections for their parties. Many obstacles make it futile to run third party candidates in most elections. Therefore the only viable candidates are chosen in **private primaries**. In New York, membership in those private parties is **limited by unreasonable deadlines that are hidden from the public**.

In 2009, bills to change the deadline to 25 days were introduced in the NY Legislature but they have been ignored. It's time to stop lying to the public and give the people access to vote in primary elections.

Senate Bill <u>\$2338</u> and Assembly Bill <u>A1423</u>

Bills were introduced in 2009 to the New York State Legislature to change the party membership deadline to 25 days before any election. These bills have been stuck "in committee" in both houses for 10 years. They have been resubmitted in 2019.

Reasons to Pass these Bills ASAP

- 1. Many voters do not align with either party on many issues but want to vote in the primary when there is a candidate that represents them. Unaffiliated voters make up about 1/3 of the electorate and cast the deciding votes in the general election yet are purposefully left out of the selecting the candidates that will run in the general election.
- 2. Most New Yorkers don't know what the deadline is or already think the deadline is 25 days as is printed on the Voter Registration Form.
- 3. It would cost nothing to change this. All other deadlines would entail the cost to change the registration form and advertise the change.
- 4. All other states have more reasonable deadlines, averaging 25 days. The majority of states also have open or semi-open primaries which allows more people to participate in these crucial elections.
- 5. It would be show good faith that our legislators are interested in what the electorate wants rather than demanding party loyalty before the prior year's general election, before the party platform is written, and before voters know which party will be in power.
- 6. 25 days is an adequate time for Board of Election workers to implement party changes.
- 7. Opponents argue that it will result in "party raiding," whereby voters change their party affiliation to overwhelm the vote in the opposing party. Evidence in other states does not support this position, and there is no evidence that the long deadline serves to prevent this when an organized group is determined.

Actions to Help Increase Primary Election Fairness

- 2. Go to Senate Bill <u>\$2338</u> and click "aye" to show support, then message your Senator to express support and ask them to "cosponsor" the bill.

NYS Board of Elections Omits and Obscures Deadline

1. The instruction on the <u>voter registration form</u> are not correct. It says, "You can also use this form to...change your party membership...25 days before the election you want to vote in."



- 2. The voter registration form completely omits the deadline, including in the <u>Political party</u> box on the form.
- 3. Prior to 2018 the NY Board of Elections website omitted the party membership deadline on the Voter Registration Deadlines page. Now it is listed under General Election Deadlines, though it is only relevant to primary elections.

4. The NYS Board of Elections website obscures the deadline in an unintelligible sentence as follows:

"A change of enrollment received no later than 25 days before the general election shall be deposited in a sealed enrollment box and opened the first Tuesday following that general election and entered in the voter's registration record."
